Methodist Conference Make Appointments For Church Year

J. E. BROWER NAMED DISTRICT HEAD AT LUMBERTON MEET

The North Carolina Conference, Central Jurisdiction, meeting in Lumberton, concluded its 87th session Sunday morning and an impressive love feast was conducted, after which Bishop Robert N. Brooks, presiding, delivered an inspiring sermon. At the close of this service, two were ordained as elders and four as deacons.

Couple Arrested For Making Love In Public Places

M/Sgt. Joseph A. Mesaus, white, was apprehended Tuesday night with Miss Louise Starr, of 609 Logan street, for public love-making.

Miss Starr was arrested for immoral vagrancy and the soldier was released to military authorities of ORD.

It was stated that Miss Starr was introduced to Sgt. Mesaus as being a Negro, and he accepted her company as such. Public sentiment ran high when the couple

attracted so much attention with their arduous love-making on East Market street. Upon the investigation of military officers and city police, it was found that the soldier was on a 90-day furlough. His record further showed that he is white, his native home being in Virginia, and that he only stopped in the city for a brief stay.

Miss Starr, pleading guilty to the charges Friday morning in city court, was sentenced to 30 days in the county home.

DR. BENJAMIN MAYS WILL SPEAK AT BENNETT SUNDAY

Dr. Benjamin Mays, president of Morehouse college, Atlanta, Ga., will give his annual address at Bennett college Sunday, November 11, during the regular vesper service.

He received the unusual honor of being named vice-president of the Federal Council of Churches of America last year. He is the first of his race to fill the post and received nationwide publicity in the press at that time.

Dr. Mays was formerly dean of the school of religion at Howard University, Washington, D. C. He is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Bates college and holds the A. M. and Ph. D. degrees from Chicago university.

WOODS TO ENTER CORNELL UNIVERSITY

Theodore R. Woods, 1106 Ashe street, has left the city to enter Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, where he will study further in the fields of animal husbandry and field crops, leading to an advanced degree. He holds a B. S. degree from Tennessee A. and I. State College, Nashville, having been inducted in the army April 14, 1941, serving until September 15, 1945, at the Station Hospital, Fort Bragg, N. C., as a laboratory technician and personnel supervisor.

Upon completion of his studies at Cornell, Mr. and Mrs. Woods will make their home in Nashville.

Bennett Will Observe Founding Reorganization

The founding and reorganization of Bennett college will be marked when the college celebrates the 72nd anniversary of its birth and its 20th year as a woman's college. Traditional exercises, with colorful academic regalia, will be held in Annie Merner Pfeiffer chapel Friday, November 16.

Principal speaker on the occasion will be Dr. Roy A. Burkhardt, pastor of the First Community church, Columbus, O. He is widely known because of the service his church renders in community youth improvement and for his writings on marriage and personal relationships.

The exercises will recall the day a small group of Negro ministers met in the basement of Saint Matthews church here in 1873, and organized Bennett Seminary, the forerunner of Bennett college. Likewise, it calls attention to the reorganization in 1926 when the institution became a woman's college and Dr. David D. Jones was elected president.
