Marriage Talks Plans Are Readied At N. C. College

Experts in marital, family and related problems from many sections of the country will converge on North Carolina College's campus here next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, April 21-23, to serve as consultants for the 11th annual Groves conference on Marriage and the Family.

Dr. J. S. Himes, professor of Sociology at North Carolina College, will be director of the conference.

A highlight of the conference will be the Tuesday evening meeting at the college's Duke auditorium with the following experts participating in the discussion: Judge Paul Alexander domestic Relation Court, Toledo, Ohio; Dr. Robert E. Lee, professor of Domestic Relations Law, Wake Forest College, Wake Forest, N. C.; Dr. A. L. Turner, dean of NCC's Law school. Dr. Alfonso Elder, president of North Carolina College will also take part in the discussion. This conference will feature a discussion of the proposals of the American Bar Association for a Therapeutic Divorce Act.

Most of the sessions of the conference, which is placing emphasis on divorce and divorce Reform laws, will be held in the N. C. College library. Its general theme is "Marriage Specialist and Divorce."

Divided into five daily sessions, the conference will devote one general session each morning to a discussion entitled "Taking Perspective of Divorce and Divorce Reform." Two seminars, one on research and teaching, a clinical session on marriage and family counselling and a viewing of recent marriage education films will also be scheduled each day.

Two evening meetings, one at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, and the other at N. C. College's B. N. Duke auditorium are also on the conference program.

TRADES CONTEST TO BE HELD AT A. & T.

The Theme for this Year's Conference will be "Youth Facing Present Crisis". This year the Hayes-Taylor Y. M. C. A. in cooperation with the City and County Schools plan to take to this Conference the largest number of boys that has ever assembled for a conference of Older Boys from Greensboro. There will be approximately 30 boys leaving for this Conference. These boys are from the various schools—Dudley High, Brown Summit, Summerfiled, J. C. Price, Mt Zion, Lincoln Street, Lutheran Grammar and Jonesboro.
