Two Murder Trials Scheduled In Guilford Superior Court Monday

Two murder trials are scheduled during the first week of a two-week criminal term of Guilford Superior Court opening here Monday. Judge Susie Sharp of Reidsville will preside.

Defendants are Pauline Waddell, 31-year-old-Negro woman of 222 East St., charged with abandoning her infant son in subfreezing weather and allowing him to die of exposure; and Eddie Watts, 32-year-old Negro of 123 Chestnut St., accused of slaying Booker T. Wilson with a knife.

The trial for the first week calendar includes:

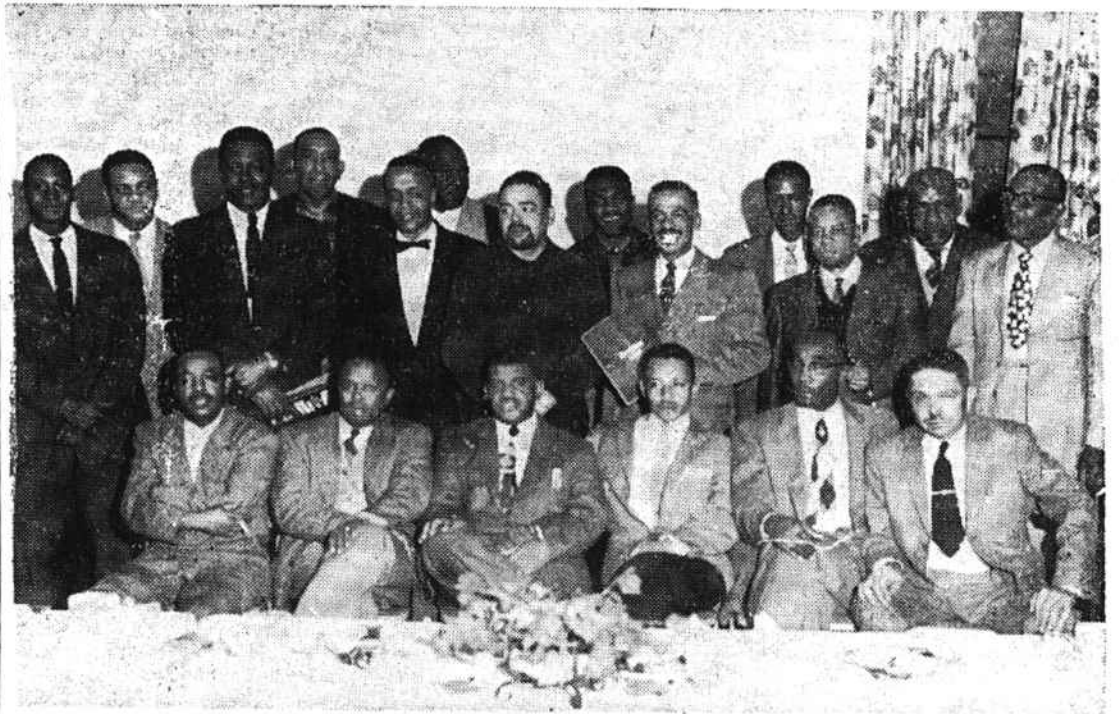

Research Project Is Underway At A & T

A research project which could have possible application in the treatment of leukemia, is underway at A&T College.

A husband-wife team of Dr. George C. Royal, Jr., professor of bacteriology and Dr. Gladys W. Royal, professor of chemistry, started on the project recently. A first year grant of \$6,900.00 has been made available by the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission in partial support of the research entitled, "Biochemical and Immunological Comparisons of Animals Protected from Radiation by Bone Marrow Treatments".

This investigation is one of a series being conducted in many laboratories with the main objective of determining the effects of radiation on physiological functions of animals. In some cases, the treatment of leukemia may involve body irradiation in an attempt to des-
