Research Project Is Underway At A & T

research project which could have possible application in the treatment of lukemia, is underway at A&T College.

A husband-wife team of Dr. George C. Royal, Jr., professor of bacteriology and Dr. Gladys W. Royal, professor of chemistry, started on the project recently. A first year grant of \$6,900.00 has been made available by the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission in partial support of the research entitled, "Biochemical and Immunological Comparisions of Animals Protected from Radiation by Bone Marrow Treatments".

This investigation is one of a series being conducted in many laboratories with the main obmode exom Suinzeel to evincel the effects of radiation on physiological functions of animals. In some cases, the treatment of lukemia may involve body irradiation in an attempt to des-
