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1200 High School Seniors Seek A&T Scholarships

More than 1200 bright high school seniors from throughout North Carolina and border points in Virginia are in competition for several scholarships being offered by A&T College to freshman students to enter this fall.

The scholarships being made available by the A&T College Alumni Association, the Smith-Douglas Company, the Kroger and Sears Roebuck Foundations are to be awarded on the basis of high scores turned in by the youths on a college entrance examination administered during the last two weeks.

The examinations sponsored by the alumni group, were given in 27 centers scattered conveniently about the State and at Norfolk, Va. Dr. F. A. Williams, dean of the A&T Graduate School and chairman of the Alumni Testing Program, stated that the largest number of students in the four year history of the program are in competition. A total of 1275 students, ranking in the upper fourth of their class took the tests. He said that the winners would be announced just as soon as the scores have been tabulated.

The top prize include four—\$1,000 scholarships being given each year by the Alumni Association and 10 or 15 smaller grants coming from individuals and corporations.

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A&T Aggies and Dudley Panthers Eliminated From Tournament At The Same Time

Evansville-A&T: 110-92; Wilmington-Dudley: 69-62

EVANSVILLE, Ind., March 12 —Evansville's hometown favorites eliminated the A&T College Aggies from the National Collegiate Small College basketball tournament here with a resounding 110-92 triumph in the tourney semifinals. The 110 points by Evansville set a meet scoring record.

Southwest Missouri whipped Los Angeles State 72-59 in the other semifinal game. Southwest Missouri now plays Evansville for the tourney championship tonight at 10 p. m. (EST), preceded by the consolation clash between Evansville and Los Angeles State at 8 p. m. (EST).

Evansville used its proficiency at the free throw line to wreck A&T tonight. It made 46 of 56 free throws as compared with A&T's 22 for 30 performance at the charity line. Four A&T players fouled out and two Evansville cagers were ousted by the infraction method.

Evansville captured a 55-46 halftime lead, but A&T narrowed it to 71-70 with 12:29 to play. The homesteaders poured on the pressure and lifted the margin to eight points with 7:41 to go. They charged in from there.

Irv Gray of A&T fouled out with 10 minutes to go, Vance Miller departed with nine minutes left, and both Joe Cotton and Charlie Harrison departed with six minutes on the clock.

Evansville's Hugh Ahlring dropped in 17 free throws in 18 attempts for a tourney record.

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Williston High of Wilmington eliminated Dudley's defending state champions from the State Class AAA basketball tournament here last night winning 69-62 at A&T Gymnasium in overtime.

In other first round games Atkins High of Winston-Salem edged Laurinburg Institute 52-49, Darden High of Wilson whipped Second Ward of Charlotte 52-46 and Washington High of Rocky Mount downed Logan High of Concord 85-46.

Pairings for tomorrow night's semifinals follow: 8:15 — Rocky Mount vs. Wilmington; 9:30 — Winston-Salem vs. Wilson.

Dudley held a massive 33-2 halftime lead over Williston, but couldn't stop the resurgent Wilmington team in the second half. Williston tied it 60-60 at the end of regulation time.

Big star of the overtime was Carlton Alford who scored five of Williston's nine points to put Williston out of reach.

Richard Pickett tallied 22 points to pace the overall point making for Williston. Big gun for Dudley were Melvin Johnson with 19 and Thomas Williamson with 12.

During the regular season Williston had a 14-2 conference record as compared with Dudley's 7-1 mark.

Harold Harriston and Williston Parker poured in 12 points each to place the Winston-Salem victory. Richard Walker with 22 sparked Laurinburg Institute.
