## HOME-SEWER CALM, COOL AND FASHION COLLECTED FOR SUMMER

**SHIRTTWAIST FOR SUMMER** insures cool comfort. Front ties ends bowing at the waistline adds fashionable detail to this full-skirted dress with notched collar. Yours for the making in linen, printed silks or cottons. McCall's Pattern #4917 in Misses sizes 10-20. 50¢.



**EMBROIDERED TRIM VARIETY** for summer classic. Dress with nine-gore skirt, cuffed short sleeves and collarless bodice is fun to make and wear. Ingenious bit of trim is the embroidered cotton band inserted in alternate panels near the lower part of the skirt and circling the waistline. Wonderful in printed cottons, dacron and cotton mixtures or striped cottons. McCall's Pattern #4546 in Misses' sizes 10-18. 50¢.

The summer shirtwaist dress is a classic. Tried and true, it is never out of style. It offers freedom of motion and simplicity. It is wearable for many, many occasions and it is always correct.

The full-skirted lime green dress with the front tie is a cousin of the shirtwaist. (McCall's Pattern No. 4917). The bodice is fitted and the four-gore skirt has unpressed pleats. The ends of the front tie are sewn in the side seams. The notch collar is cut in one with the front bodice and the sleeves are cut in one with the back and front bodice. The pattern also carries pieces for a slim skirt. Made in misses sizes, this pattern lends itself to many fabrics. Ideal as a summer print, it would make a wonderful fall opener in tissue weight wool or flannel.

The other dress of blue and white ticking (launders beautifully) is amazingly easy to make. (McCall's Pattern No. 4546). It is practically mistake-proof, even for those sewing for the first time. The nine-gore skirt pieces are straight, and gathered at the natural waistline. The short sleeves are cuffed and the fitted bodice collarless. Four self buttons close the back opening. An ingenious bit of trim are the embroidered cotton bands about the waist and near the lower part of the skirt. Ribbon or lace may be substituted, or simply a contrasting belt may be used. Any of the cotton and synthetic fabrics may be used for this pattern.

**Weekly Fashion - Sewing Tip** Don't, if you find one seam longer than the other, slice off a bit at the end. If one side is longer, you have stretched it in handling.

One of the smartest ways to look cool and composed during the hot summer months is to wear a "cover up" dress. Contrary to popular opinion, a strapless, revealing dress does not necessarily make the wearer any cooler. Usually, these latter dresses don't even give the illusion of comfort and composure.

It's a funny thing about strapless summer cottons, incidentally. They have an unerring attraction for shy, inhibited ladies. Members of this rather conservative group

are wont to bloom out in the summer with bare shoulders and plunging necklines down to there. For some reason or other, the summer offers them a challenge and a chance to be daring.

Be that as it may, however, most women frown on wearing too revealing dresses on city streets. As much as they would like to spend every hot day in short shorts, they know that they must conform, and they try to reach a happy combination of comfort, coolness and social acceptance.
