False Fire Alarm Brings Heavy Fine On Holt

Marshall A. Holt, who said he was drinking and didn't know what he was doing when he turned in a false fire alarm Tuesday was ordered Wednesday to pay \$100 to the fire department.

Fire Chief C. W. Wyrick said the \$100 would take care of a \$50 cost for fire equipment answering the call and a \$50 reward to Mrs. Emma Haith, a taxicab switchboard operator, for identifying the false caller. She was not aware of the reward, but considered herself doing a citizen's duty.

Mrs. Haith told Judge Hampton Howerton Jr. of Municipal County Court she saw Marshall A. Holt, 43, of Rt. 6, Greensboro, turn in the alarm at East Market and Regan Streets.

Tells of Incident

She said Holt was drinking and admitted that he knew it was a fire alarm box when he pulled the alarm. He denied it later.

Judge Howerton also gave Holt a 30-day suspended term and fined him \$1 and costs.

Horace H. Westbrook, 46, of 1616 Martin St., was given a two-year suspended sentence and was fined \$10 and costs on eight charges of violating employment security laws by fraudulent employment benefits.

A 30-day license suspension was imposed on Olin Dean Matthews, 18, of 1007 Richardson St., who was fined \$5 and costs for running a stop sign.

The Interdenominational Ushers Convention Held in Wilmington

The Thirty Sixth Annual Session of the Interdenominational Ushers Association of North Carolina was held at St. Stephens A.M.E. Church in Wilmington, N. C., August 25-28.

Miss Frances Delores Beam, junior usher at St. Matthews Methodist Church and the Usher's Union of Greensboro won second prize in an oratorical contest. The prize is a scholarship to any college she chooses to attend.

First prize was won by a high school girl from Wilmington and third prize was won by a Junior College boy of Wilmington.

Rev. Ulric George of Trinidad, served as judge and also rendered musical selections. A highlight of the session was the approval of a \$60,000 drive to be raised for the Old Folk's Home in Franklinton, N. C., by Dr. Winston, Head of the Welfare of North Carolina. The drive will last for three months.

About four hundred delegates from North Carolina attended the convention. About fifteen delegates from Greensboro attended.

Arthur Crump, president of Greensboro Usher's Union is supervisor from District No. 3 which includes Greensboro, Winston - Salem, Thomasville, High Point and Reidsville.

C. R. Craig of Greensboro is chairman over all ten districts of North Carolina.

Mr. Crump, president of the Greensboro Usher's Union stated that the Greensboro Usher's Union will announce a project for a financial drive to meet the quota of \$60,000.

The treasurer's report on the convention was about \$8,000.
