

GOVERNOR OF MASS. NAMED ASSISTANT PROF. OF COMMERCE AT NCC

Durham, N. C. — Lawrence A. Johnson of 83 Waumbuck Ave., Boston, Mass., former military aid to the Governor of Massachusetts, has been named as an assistant professor of commerce at North Carolina College.

Johnson, who's currently studying for the Ph. D. degree in industrial relations at Stanford University, served as captain in the United States Army in the South West Pacific during World War II and again during the Korean campaign.

He received the B. A., B. S. and M. B. A. degrees from Boston University.

The new NCC teacher was appointed military aid to the Governor of Massachusetts in 1958.

Johnson is currently a major in the U. S. XIII Army Corps with headquarters at Fort Devens, Mass.

His teaching experience includes one year at Arkansas A. and M. University and several terms with the U. S. Army.

Johnson comes to NCC from the Stanford Research Institute at Menlo Park, Calif.

Operation of a private cosmetics firm and direction of the advertising program for Filene's Store of Boston are among his business experiences.

Duke Auditorium will be the scene of the year's first Sunday School at 9 a.m. The term's first vesper message will be given at 3:30 p.m. by Dr. J. Neal Hughley, college minister.

Library orientation, special meetings for scholarship students, and feature programs of the men's and women's student personnel services will be held Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday (Sept. 19, 20, 21).

Registration is scheduled for Thursday (Sept. 22) with classes slated to begin for the fall semester at 8 a.m. Friday, Sept. 23.

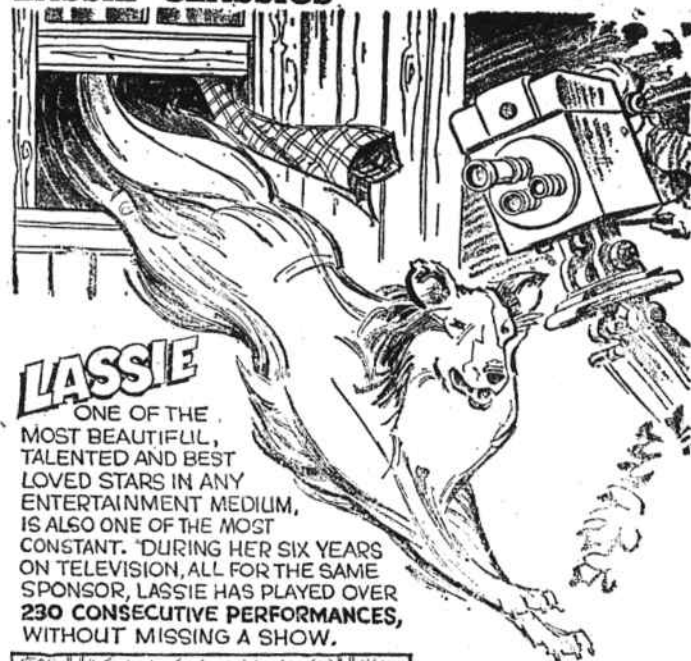
The Aggies will be seeking their first win, in five starts, over the Tennessee club.

The game shapes up this season a battle between a hard running assault, afforded by the Nashville outfit, and a deadly passing attack generated by the Aggies.

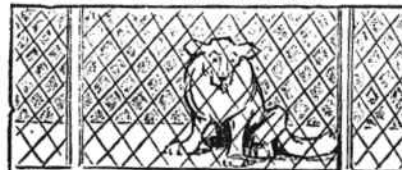
It is the season opener for both clubs.

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
