The new president is expected to continue these forward steps made by the club under Mr. Poole's leadership.

Mr. Penn, a self made photographer, has been a member of the club three years. During this short time he has distinguished himself with his camera in many ways: At the 1962 exhibit, he won most of the ribbons given that year for the many brilliant ideas shown in his pictures; and again in 1963, by capturing both the silver and bronze medals as well as 7 of the 18 ribbons awarded for his excellent work.

At the present time he is active in his local camera club, a member of the Photographic Society of America, an international organization, and the official photographer for the Lincoln Junior High School of Greensboro, N. C. Yet, whenever he has the time he is open for private portraits and commercial work.

Mr. Penn's chief bread winning activities are absorbed in the teaching of mathematics and

science at the Lincoln Junior High School. He is also the adviser to the photographic club



of the school for the regular term. His academic preparation for his profession of teaching was gained at North Carolina, A&T where he obtained the B.S. and M.S. degrees. His drive in photography does not stop when vacation time come because during the summer months, he does free lance photography at Atlantic Beach, S. C.
