#### Harass Blind Man Who Gave Swimming For CORE

Tucson, Arizona - Charles Hamill, a 72-year-old, blind retired manufacturer who offered, his swimming pool for a fund-raising party for Tucson CORE, has been harassed in a manner reminiscent of the deep south.

On the eve of the Party, he had received several threatening phone calls from persons accusing him of being a "nigger-lover" and "Communist" and warning him to "beware of the dark."

Several days after the party, when his wife was out, his pool was polluted with two gallons of motor oil. Being blind, he was unable, to identify the vandals. Commenting on their action, he said, ironically: That took real courage, didn't it?"

The most recent harassment was a bomb threat. A voice which sounded like that of an elderly man threatened "to bomb you and the niggers."
