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CIAA Tournament In Session At The Greensboro Coliseum

GREENSBORO — The Winston-Salem State Rams, featuring national scoring champion Earl Monroe, will be the team to beat in the 22nd annual Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association Basketball Tournament.

The tourney will be played at War Memorial Coliseum in Greensboro Thursday, Friday and Saturday, March 2, 3 and 4. Four opening round games will be played in two sessions Thursday, the afternoon at 1:30 P.M. and the evening at 7:00 P.M.

Semifinals will be played at 7:00 P.M. Friday, and the consolation and championship session will begin at 7:00 P.M. Saturday.

Winston-Salem State finished the season in first place, undefeated in 19 CIAA games. Earl Monroe wrapped up the conference scoring championship with more than 1,000 points, the first Winston-Salem player to achieve this total in school history. The Rams will be favored be-
