## GREENSBORO USHER'S COUNCIL TO MEET

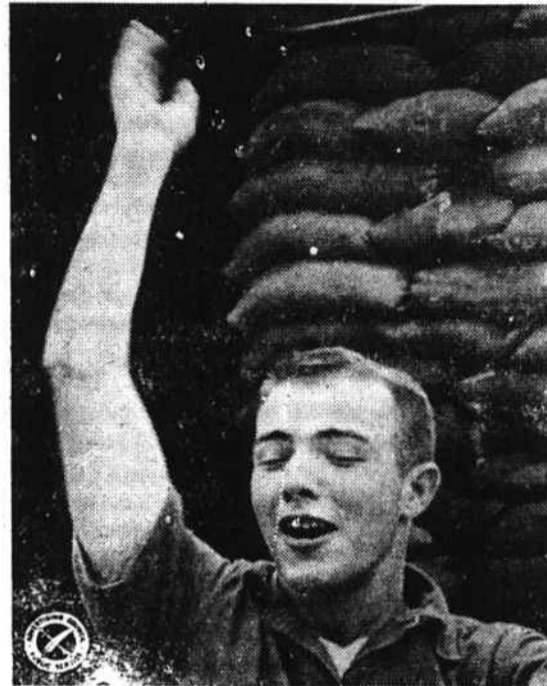

Dr. Daniel Williams, and George Washington Carver. Again a record was played in which it was very vividly shown the difficulties overcome by Dr. Carver as he endeavored to secure an education. This was most interesting, in that the record carried the actual voice of Dr. Carver.

"Stars" in the field of Religion, were: Augusta Tolen, Thomas Paul, Richard Allen, Daniel Alexander Payne, James Augusta Healey, Adam Clayton Powell.

"Stars" in the field of Music mentioned, were: Harry T. Burleigh, R. Nathaniel Dett, Paul Robeson, Roland Hayes, Marion Anderson.

Miss Harrington's very wonderful message was concluded with another recording — this time, numbers sung by the Tuskegee Institute Choir. Among them: "Ezekiel Saw the Wheel" — "Deep River" — "Couldn't Hear Nobody Pray."
