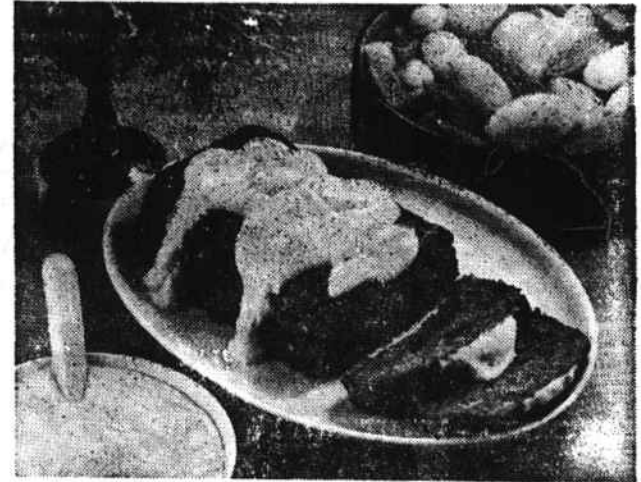

| 2 beaten egg yolks | 1 tablespoon butter |
| 1 tablespoon sugar | 1 tablespoon prepared horseradish |
| 3 tablespoons prepared mustard | 1/2 cup undiluted Carnation Evaporated Milk |
| 2 tablespoons cider vinegar | 1 tablespoon lemon juice |
| 1 tablespoon water | |
| 3/4 teaspoon salt | |

Place egg yolks, sugar, mustard, vinegar, water and salt in top of double boiler. Cook over hot water (not boiling) stirring constantly until mixture thickens, 4-5 minutes. Blend in butter and horseradish. Cool thoroughly. Chill Carnation in refrigerator tray until soft ice crystals form around edges of tray (10 to 15 minutes). Whip until stiff (1 minute). Add lemon juice. Whip until very stiff (1 minute longer). Fold into egg mixture. Serve with hot ham loaf or store in the refrigerator (remove 30 minutes before serving).
