He said that Engineering Aids and Science Assistants recruited under the new exam would work closely with professional engineers and scientists in such fields as biology, medicine, engineering, surveying, geodesy, meteorology, drafing, physical science cartography. mathematics. electronics, and industrial engineering.

Chairman Macy urged students who are completing their second year of college to continue their education if at all possible. "However." he said, "if you are seeking full-time employment at the end of this school year, the Engineering Aid and Science Assistant examination may provide you the opportunity for challenging work in

one of many technial fields." Candidates applying for Federal jobs under the new examination will not be required to take a written test.

Those who have completed, or are in the process of completing, their second year of college must have at least 24 semester hours in any combination of engineering, science, techinology, or mathematics except commercial or financial mathematics.


