Announcing the examination, CSC Chairman John W. Macy, Jr., said:
"Federal agencies have struggled for years with a growin shortage of professional scient ists and engincers. We are seeking to alleviate this shortage by recruiting two - year college on the proiessionals. At the same time, we ar extending solid career opportunities to junior college graduates and others who have the port of scientsts and engineers.
He said that Engineering Aids and Science Assistants recruited under the new exam would work cosely with professional engineers and scientists in such fields as biology, medicine, engineering, surveying, geodesy, meteorology, dirafting, pisysical science cartography. mathematics. electronics, and industrial engineering.
Chairman Macy urged students who are completing their second vear of college to continne their education if at all possible. "However." he said, "if you are seeking full-time emchovment at the end of this and Science Assistant examination mav provide vou the opportunitv for challencing work in one of many techncal fields." Candidates apolving for Federal inhe under the new examin ation will not be required to take a written test.
Those who have comoleted, or are in the nrocess of comnletine thpir second vear of college must have at least 24 semester houre in anv combination of enginearing. science techinology. or mathemation cial nr financial mathematics. Others who have had two yeare nf technical experience in eneineerine or in the africultural. binlngical, medical. or phvsical sriences. or in allied field of work which provided knowledge of the eauipment, methods. and practices used in the appropriate fields, also may
