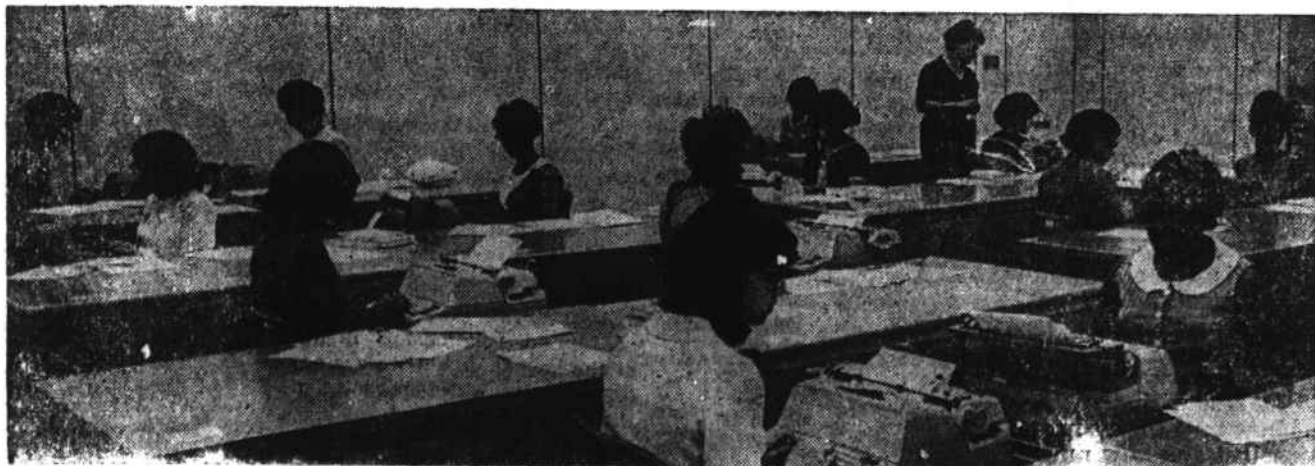

Humble Oil Company Calls For Trained Help



Help is what Humble Oil calls its new Earn and Learn Program. The first class of fifteen young women attending typing (above) and shorthand courses while they worked at temporary jobs such as filing, coding and operating copying machines. At least seven members of the class were hired by Humble or other firms at the end of the first earn-and-learn period. The oil company started its program when it had several vacancies for stenographers in Houston, its headquarters, but couldn't find enough young women who qualified for the jobs.
