The N. C. A. and T. State University NCAS Chapter was chartered under the authorization of the Director of the Division of Business, Dr. T. Mahaffey. The National Collegiate Association for Secretaries is a professional organization for undergraduate college men and women who are planning business or teaching careers in the secretarial area.

As the national economy becomes increasingly industrialized, employment in the secretarial field offers greater challenges and provides excellent opportunities for a satisfying career. Secretaries assist management in the administration of the business enterprise and must have the qualities essential to decision-making roles in busi-

ness. NCAS hopes to effect a better understanding in the business world of the capabilities of the college-educated secretary who is prepared to be an administrative assistant. As businessmen recognize the capabilities of the college-educated secretary, his or her work will become more challenging and interesting.

The college-educated secretary are becoming more numerous. college-bound youth must be informed of these opportunities and the nature of the program of studies in the collegiate secretarial curriculum. NCAS hopes to reach these youth by providing this information and assistance to high school counselors who can then more intelligently advise high school youth of the opportunities in business for the graduate of a collegiate secretarial program.

The NCAS activities are designed to:

- Apprise employers in business and industry of the potential of graduates of a collegiate secretarial program for administrative responsibilities.
- Effect a better understanding among guidance counselors of the distinctions between business careers open to
