The optimistic progress report was made Monday evening at a Chapter banquet in the Memorial Union Ballroom at A&T.

"We are confident that we are going to reach our goal," said Marvin B. Graeber and the Rev. Sampson Buie, co-chairmen of the local campaign.

Keynote speaker at the banquet was Dr. Lewis C. Dowdy, president of A&T. Dr. Dowdy told the graduates that the developing of leaders was now a high priority of the University.

"We have got to change both our attitude towards giving and our aspirations," said Dr. Dowdy. "We have also got to provide an opportunity for our students to develop their minds."

Dr. Dowdy also said that the University must provide a balance to offset the "student

"Power," said Dr. Dowdy, is no good without leaders and control." Others taking part in the program were George Pierce and Mrs. D. D. Canada, president of Gate City Chapter, and Ellis F. Corbett executive secretary of the national Alumni Association.
