Symbols uttered the unspoken word. The Torah Scroll, which had belonged to President John F. Kennedy is carried by Rabbi Eisendrath. He had presented the Torah to the late President at a White House ceremony in 1961 on behalf of the UAHC.

Following the assassination, the Kennedy Family temporarily returned the Torah to the UAHC Religious Action Center in Washington to hold until the completion of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Library where it will find its permanent home. The 200-year-old scroll previously belonged to the founder of American Reform Judaism, Rabbi Isaac Mayer Wise, who brought it from Bohemia when he came to this country to escape religious paracution.
