DR. S. E. DUNCAN, PRESIDENT OF LIVINGSTONE COLLEGE DIES

SALISBURY (AP)—Dr. Samuel E. Duncan, president of Livingstone College in Salisbury since 1958, died Wednesday afternoon after becoming ill at his home. He was 63.

Dr. Duncan was pronounced dead on arrival at Rowan Memorial Hospital. He had suffered two illnesses in 1967.

In 1957, he was elected president of the North Carolina Council of Churches, becoming the first Negro elected to the post. He was named to the North Carolina Board of Higher Education in 1965 and had been a member of the North Carolina Board of Welfare and the board of the North Carolina Fund.

Dr. Duncan was a native of Middlesboro, Ky. He moved to Salisbury with his family at an early age and was graduated from Livingstone College in 1927. He received master's and Ph.D. degrees from Cornell University in New York.

He was named president of the predominantly Negro col-

lege in Salisbury in 1958 and during the last 10 years he had directed a multimillion dollar development program on the campus.

He took over the college presidency after serving as principal

3 Administrative Deans Appointed At A.&T.

The appointment of three new deans and the creation of a new School of Arts and Sciences were announced Wednesday at A&T State University.

Dr. Lewis C. Dowdy, president of A&T, said that Dr. Reginald Amory had been named dean of the School of Engineering, Dr. Jewellean S. Mangaroo had been named Dean of the School of Nursing and Dr. Arthur F. Jackson would be dean of the newly created School of Arts and Sciences.

The appointments are effectively immediately, except that of Dr. Mangaroo. She will assume her position on February 1. Her predecessor, Mrs. Naomi Wynn will remain until February as dean and then return to full-time teaching as a professor of nursing.

Dr. Dowdy also announced that Dr. Walter C. Daniel, chairman of the English Department, has been appointed chairman of the new Division of Humanities.
