Brown, who has been serving as assistant football coach and head tennis coach, will serve as administrative assistant to Albert Smith, athletic director.

"I am happy to have both of these men to join our athletic staff," said Smith. "I am sure they will make a valuable contribution to our growing program."

Brown, a graduate of Canton McKinley High, first came to A&T in 1949 under former head coach Bill Bell, also a former Ohio State great. Brown left A&T in 1953, but returned to the staff last year.

He played quarterback Ohio State from 1943-45 and in 1944 guided the Buckeyes to their first undefeated season in 27 years.
