A&T RECEIVES \$147,000 GRANT TO ESTABLISH TRANSPORT INSTITUTE

GREENSBORO, N. C.—A&T State University has received a \$147,972 grant from the U. S. Department of Transportation to establish an institute for research and teaching of a number of problems related to urban transportation.

According to Dr. Reginald Amory, dean of the A&T School of Engineering, the project will be conducted on an interdisciplinary basis, the departments of economics and architectural engineering and the Division of Business.

Dr. Amory and Dr. Evans, acting head of the Department of Economics, will serve as co-directors of the proposed Transportation Institute.

"Although our focus will be on the study of transportation problems in the cities," said Amory, "we shall also train undergraduates in the critical area of transportation."

Amory said that by making students aware of the scale of problems involved in transportation, more of them will be attracted into transportation related agencies and industries.

Besides offering undergraduate training, Amory said the new Transportation Institute will serve as a regional center for elected officials, community leaders, as well as local and state engineers, architects, planners and other professionals.

"We hope to offer short courses, colloquia and workshops designed to provide instruction in

current techniques and concepts in transportation," added Amory. One of the problems already being studied by Dr. Jan Stulinsky, an engineering professor at A&T, is the feasibility of the use of "carless and limited" traffic in residential and downtown areas.

"Cities today are not cities for humans," said Stulinsky. "They are cities for cars."

Other institute faculty members will be Anwar Kahn, Dr. Alice E. Kidder, Howard F. Robinson, Dr. Florentine V. Sowell, William A. Streat, Jr.
