lieved will not suffice. In our day, we must be prepared to interpret the gospel. . . ."

Our writer's admonition that we need to interpret the gospel to people and not just repeat old phrases loved by the congregation implies that we must get involved in their lives; we must understand what makes them tick. And this is the point made by Harvey Cox, the second theologian we quoted in the first section of the lesson. Read his statement again.

Involvement here means seeing the world through the eyes of the other person and being willing to talk with him in his language. Obviously this language will vary, depending on the person. Let us listen in as one man relates his experience:

"My daughter and my sons say — as daughters and sons do these days — that they cannot talk to me about sin but that they can talk about estrangement and brokenness. Good. At least we are talking and their words . . . get closer to the root of the human problem than mine do. . . . If you are dealing with a juvenile delinquent whose tyrannical parents have beaten and abandoned him, it might be better to speak of God as a probation officer than as a father. The point is that we should not permit our preference for certain ancient and cherished terminologies that may have served well enough in their time to block the communication of the gospel."

Hebrews 1 and Acts 17 are important to us in part because they keep us reminded, in these difficult days, that the New Testament writers — persons who also lived in difficult times — spoke to people where they were. Can we do the same?

We thank thee, our Father, for the revelation of thyself in the life, death, and resurrection of thy Son, Jesus. Continue to make real his presence among us through the recorded memory of his deeds in Scripture. By the power of thy Holy Spirit, make us participants in his dream for the reconciliation of man. Amen.
