#### Veterans' Corner

Editor's Note: Below are authoritative answers by the Veterans Administration to some of the many current questions from former servicemen and their families. Further information on veterans benefits may be obtained at any VA office.

Q - Are widows of World War II veterans who died on active duty or from serviceconnected disabilities still eligible for GI home loans?

A - Yes. Unused, expired entitlement for widows of World War II veterans, as well as for veterans themselves, was revived by recent legislation.

Q - My husband has a total and permanent disability from a service-connected injury. Can my children be recipients of VA educational assistance?

A - It is likely that you and your children are eligible for The celebration of the open- At 3:00 P.M., Dr. H. W. Fields, assistance to wives and children

Q - I am eligible for training under the VA vocational rehabilitation program. Is it possible for me to take part-time

A - Yes. This has been possible since July 26, 1968.

Q - I am a Vietnam veteran discharged May 2, 1967, attending school under the GI Bill. Does this bar me from the home loan benefit?

A - No. The availability of the home loan benefit is not affected by the education benefit in any manner whatsoever.
