2,000 Expected To Attend Annual Summer Sessions at A&T

More than 2.000 students are expected to attend summer sessions at A&T State University. according to J. Neil Armstrong, director.

Armstrong said the summer session, which begins on June 14, will also include a number of special workshops and institutes. The regular summer session will end on Aug. 13.

A six-week session will be held from June 14 to July 23 and a three week session is planned for July 26 to Aug. 13.

Special workshops include a federally-sponsored institute for high school teachers of biology, institute for high school and junior high school music students, and an industrial arts workshop on "The World of Construction," a new curiculum project.
