The Veterans Corner

Editor's Note: Veterans and their dependents are asking thousands of questions concerning the benefits their Government provides for them through the Veterans Administration. Below are some representative queries. Additional information may be obtained at any VA office.

Q — I am a veteran who served three years on active duty from 1958 to 1961. I am totally disabled because of an automobile accident. Am I entitled to a non-service connected pension?

A - No. Pension is payable only to veterans of wartime service. Your active duty was during peacetime.


Q - I am undecided as to my program of education, and wonder if the VA will provide counseling?

- Yes. A veteran may apply for counseling by the VA to assist him in selecting a program and educational goal. He may apply for it before beginning training on the VA application form 21E-1990, or at a later date by letter. There is no charge for counseling, but the veteran must pay any travel expense to and from the counseling location.

Q - If I sel my mobile home, can the GI loan be assumed by the purchaser?

A - Yes. However, you will remain liable for the loan unless you apply to VA for a release from liability, and the VA grants the release in writing Further, you may not use your GI loan entitlement for any other purpose until the mobile home loan has been paid in full, regardless of whether VA releases you from liability on the loan or not. If the buyer obtains new financing in connection with the sale and the GI mobile home loan is paid in full, you will have no further liability on the loan and may then use your entitlement for other purposes.

About 175,000 widows of veterans who died of service-connected disabilities and 65,000 wives of veterans totally disabled in service are eligible for educational benefits. Individuals interested in these benefits are urged to contact the nearest VA office or local veterans service organization representative.
