## A&T RECEIVES GRANT OF \$10,000 FROM GENERAL ELECTRIC CORP.

Bridgeport, Conn. — General Electric Foundation grants of \$10,000 to each of five predominantly Negro engineering schools have been announced by Dr. Donald J. Watson, Secretary of the Foundation.

This marks the third consecutive year that such grants have been allocated to the five schools for faculty development and improvement or support of student, with the three-year commitment totaling \$125,000.

Schools receiving the grants are as follows: North Carolina A&T State University, Greensboro, N. C.; Prairie View A&M College, Prairie View, Texas;

Southern University, Baton Rouge, La.; Tennessee State University, Nashville, Tenn. and Tuskegee Institute, Tuskegee, Ala.

In announcing the program, Dr. Watson said, "Funds are made available to the respective deans of the engineering schools for use in faculty development or student support, as the particular needs dictate."

The grants are part of a more than \$2,980,000 support package sponsored in 1971 by the General Electric Company and the General Electric Foundation, an independent trust established by the Company in 1952.

## Watchtower Convention To Be Held July 7-11 At Greensboro Coliseum

Most persons are familiar with Jehovah's Witnesses, for their public ministry has taken them to the homes of people from all walks of life and into almost every town and country throughout the world. As the Witnesses call at the homes, many introduce themselves by name and then state that they are "engaging in an educational work." Why do they speak of the Watchtower Society as an educational society? What does their educational work include?

David J. Thomas, convention director for the "Divine Name" District Assembly to be held in Greensboro from July 7-11 commented on these matters.

"That ours is an educational society is obvious from the work we do and the study we encourage," Thomas said. "The entire organization is geared for Bible education, and we suggest a daily reading of the Scriptures. In each of the more than 26,000 congregations around the world, five hours of Bible study courses are held weekly to train and equip each member in Bible history, research, public speaking and their house-to-house ministry." Mr. Thomas explained that each congregation operates a school with qualified teachers so that each member can personally benefit from Bible instruction. This weekly program is called the Theocratic Ministry School. Students are assigned talks on Bible subjects, which they prepare and then deliver to the congregation. The

unique aspect of this school is that there is no graduation. Another feature is that all members are free to join, both young and old, male and female. It is not uncommon, according to Mr. Thomas, to see a youngster eight to ten years of age on the platform, delivering a well-prepared Bible discourse. After each student delivers his assignment, he is given kindly counsel by the instructor.

In addition to their local congregation meetings, the Witnesses organize conventions of various sizes where advance courses in ministerial training are presented, as will be done at the coming Greensboro convention. The program for these conventions is designed to better equip its members to stimulate Bible education in the various communities to which they belong.

As they strive to educate themselves and others on vital Biblical topics, the Witnesses make good use of the printed page. Many varied publications are used to good advantage by providing printed sermons and home Bible study courses.

During the convention in Greensboro, the delegates will be continuing their Bible education work by calling on the homes of local residents with brief sermon. They will be offering to demonstrate the free course in home Bible study and will invite all persons to attend the local convention.
