Editor's Note: Below are authoritative answers by the Veterans Administration to some of the many current questions from former servicemen and their families. Further information on veterans benefits may be obtained at any VA office or your local service organization representative.

Q — I am under 65 years of age and am receiving a disability pension through the VA as well as disability Social Security benefits. May I deduct my medical expenses from my income reportable for pension purposes?

A — You should list the medical expenses paid for the treatment of the disabilities which qualified you for Social Security disability benefits. The VA will deduct these expenses from your Social Security income.

Q — Are business loans available for post-Korean and Vietnam Era veterans under any VA program?

A — No. Business loans are not authorized by VA for these veterans. Like other citizens, they should contact the Small Business Administration.

Q — I attend school under the GI Bill, and married after I started classes. Will I receive more money because I now have a wife?

A — In most instances your education allowance will be increased as a result of your marriage. To apply for these benefits, send the VA a copy of your marriage license, along with your VA claim number. For further information contact the nearest VA office or your local veterans service organization representative.

Q — I plan to attend college under the GI Bill, and understand that I must submit, at intervals, a certificate of attendance card. Is this true?

A — Yes, veterans attending college under the GI Bill are required to return a certification card to the VA during the last month of each enrollment period. Students studying under the GI Bill below the college level must submit a certificate of attendance card every month.

Q — I have read that some national cemeteries are filling up, and will soon close. Will VA pay an additional allowance toward purchasing a plot in a private cemetery?

A — There is no provision for VA to pay anything upon

THREE STUDENTS FROM A&T STATE ENLIST IN U. S. AIR FORCE

Raleigh, N. C. — Mr. William H. Cox, David E. Edwards and Edwin L. Gay, all from A&T University, Greensboro, N. C. have enlisted in the United States Air Force.

Technical Sergeant Lonnie H. Howard, Greensboro Recruiter, said the three took the oath of enlistment in Raleigh, June 22nd and departed the same day by jet for Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, for their first phase of training.

According to Sergeant Howard, local Air Force Recruiter, the Air Force has given him the okay to enlist young men under a buddy system. This plan allows two or more buddies to en-

list together, fly to Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas, together and remain in the same flight through their six weeks of basic training. Most will separate after completing basic training, but some usually go at least to their next base together.

William, David and Edwin all three hope to get into the Administrative career field in the Air Force. After completing their initial training at Lackland they will be assigned to technical schools or go directly to one of the many Air Force Bases throughout the United States for on the job training.

22,000 EXPECTED TO ATTEND WATCHTOWER CONVENTION

Due to the large influx of requests for rooming accommodations that have come to the Watchtower Convention headquarters in Greensboro, Jehovah's Witnesses have now estimated that more than 22,000 could be expected for the five-day assembly, July 7-11, at the Coliseum. This has presented an increased rooming problem, that must be solved within a few days.

Chester D. Wallace, rooming manager for the convention, stated that all of the hotel and motel accommodations have been taken, and the Witnesses are increasing their efforts to find local residents who have spare

bedrooms and would like to rent them to the visiting delegates.

Mr. Wallace mentioned that at the present time over 1700 more accommodations are needed, with letters coming in daily for more rooms. More will be attending the convention than were originally expected. What started out to be a convention for North Carolina and parts of Virginia, Kentucky and Tennessee, has now taken on a wider scope with room requests coming in from several states. Many are combining their vacations with the local convention and will be spending extra days in the area.
