## Veterans' Corner

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Below are authoritative answers by the Veterans Administration to some of the many current questions from former servicemen and their families. Further information on veterans benefits may be obtained at any VA office or your local veterans service organization representative.)

**Q**—Is the sale of VA repossessed homes limited to veterans only?

**A**—No. Anyone who qualifies may purchase these homes whether they are veterans or non-veterans.

**Q**—I will attend college this fall under the G.I. Bill. When can I expect my first check?

**A**—VA cannot state an exact date. When VA receives the enrollment certification from the school, it generally will require from four to six weeks to process it for payment.

**Q**—Can a veteran who has \$10,000 NSLI and later becomes service-connected for disability also be eligible for RH insurance?

**A**—No. A veteran can carry only \$10,000 worth of government life insurance. However, if a veteran is eligible for RH (Continued on Page 5)

## Exciting A&T Summer Program Provides Outlet for 650 Needy Kids

An A&T State University summer program of activity and learning skills for 650 children from the Greensboro community is being pictured as a possible model for similar programs elsewhere in the nation.

"We have the only program of this kind in the state," said Dr. Roy D. Moore, director of the National Youth Summer Sports Program, "and we are considered one of the top programs in the country."

Five afternoons per week, the energetic youngsters swarm on the A&T campus for an ambitious program of games, personal enrichment classes and various kinds of tests.

Funded by nearly \$50,000 in funds from the federal government, the Piedmont Triad Criminal Planning Agency, the City of Greensboro and the North Carolina Special Food Program, the project attracts busloads of children from Spring View, Morningside, Smith Homes, Hampton Homes and the Claremont Homes area.

Our program has attracted attention because it is instructional

in nature," said Moore, who also serves as chairman of the Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation at A&T. "We instruct the kids in gymnastics, dance, swimming, track and field, basketball, tennis and football, but we also work with their parents."

On Wednesdays and Thursday, Moore said his staff meet with the parents in one of the recreation rooms at the housing projects.

"We talk with them about such things as developing family solidarity, effective food-burning practices and food preparation," said Moore.

One of the highlights of the program at A&T is a full-course evening meal, served at the conclusion of the activity period in one of the campus cafeterias.

In addition, the youngsters receive special classes in personal health, career goals and the benefits of staying in school. Although staff members are coaches and physical education majors, the program is assisted by social workers and other
