Joseph D. Williams, Sr. who served last year as athletic director at Atkins High School in Winston-Salem, N. C. was named Tuesday as associate director of planning and development for alumni affairs at A&T State

University.

Williams, 46, will assume his new duties at the University on Sept. 1. He replaces the late Ellis F. Corbett.

Williams' appointment was announced by Dr. Lewis C. Dowdy, president of A&T. "We welcome the addition of Joe Williams to this important position," said Dowdy. His success in the many other ventures he has undertaken, indicates that he will apply leadership and dedication to our vital alumni program. This has been one of our most encouraging channels of support in recent years." In his new role, Williams will assist Marshall H. Colston, newly appointed director of planning and development at A&T.

Williams, a native of Winston-Salem, was a star football tackle at A&T in the late 1940s, earning All-CIAA honors three seasons and Black All-America honors one year.
