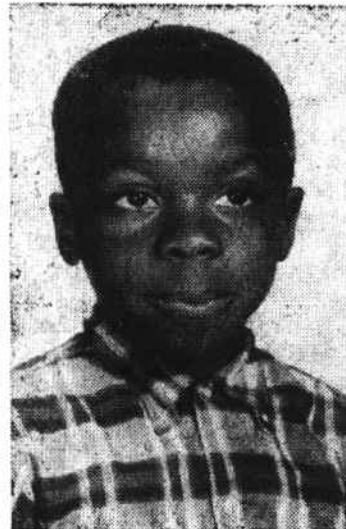

1,300 Freshmen Welcomed To A&T State

Record 1,300 A&T Freshmen Sends Officials To State For Funds

The enrollment of more than 1,300 new students at A&T State University this semester is sending Dr. Lewis C. Dowdy to Raleigh Tuesday to request funds to alleviate a teacher shortage at the University.

The A&T president said the present head count (with registrations still coming in) is a record 4,142 students.

"The State Legislature underestimated our expected enrollment," said Dowdy. "On the basis of the Legislature's estimate of 3,650 full-time students, we lost 9.5 positions at a cost of \$100,000."

"I am reasonably sure that we will get these positions back," added Dowdy. "With an enrollment head count of 4,142, he estimated that the full-time equivalent student number will probably exceed A&T's projected enrollment of 3,800."

"The current personnel shortage could not have been avoided

because of the unexpected increase in enrollment," said Dowdy, "but we are going to Raleigh with our reports so that we can make adjustments."

Dowdy said teachers are needed in the areas of English history, mathematics, psychology and art. Technicians are needed for the biology and chemistry departments.

William H. Gamble, director of admissions at A&T, said the increase in enrollment can be attributed to a new recruitment program instituted last year and to new programs in engineering and other areas.

A&T also received 100 new students under a joint program funded by the federal government and the Model City Commission of High Point.

Gamble said that even the recent increase in tuition for out-of-state students had failed to decrease applications of these students to A&T.

5,000 LOYAL FANS TURN OUT TO SEE AGGIE TEAM SCRIMMAGE

It was hard to believe that 5,000 persons would show up to see a football scrimmage, but that's what happened at North Carolina A&T last Saturday.

Billed as the first annual Blue-Gold game, the intra-squad

scrimmage was a real attraction to Greensboro's Memorial Stadium. These were all paying customers.

In the football game itself, Paul McKibbens won the battle
