Paul McKibbins Is Top Collegiate Quarterback

Football requires the coordination of several players, but one in particular guides the fortune of the entire pack.

The man who leads by example makes split second decisions and shows consistency as well as the ability to make bit play, must be the man jamming his hands into the rear of his offensive center - the college quarterback.

North Carolina A&T has two freshmen field generals who can make things happen, one of whom is Paul McKibbins from West Fulton High School in Atlanta, Ga.

With so much pressure on a freshman, McKibbins says, "A quarterback must have coolness. He has to be able to put things together and see what's going on during every play.

And it's nothing like high school ball.
