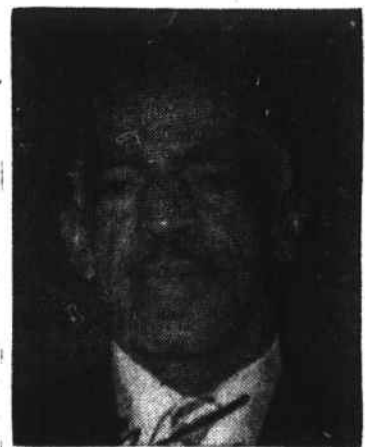

Black Colleges Never Fully Funded, Hawkins Tells A&T Audience

Dr. Reginald Hawkins of Charlotte last Sunday charged the state with shameful neglect in the appropriation of funds for predominately-black institutions of higher learning.

He also warned a Founder's Day convocation at A&T State University to be on guard for any forthcoming plans to phase

out any of the black institutions. "I believe that the President we have now is on a course of benign neglect," said Hawkins, a candidate for the state's governorship. "And I also believe that the state of North Carolina has been in a state of

International School Art Program

Junior and senior high schools in the Greensboro Public School System will participate in the International School Art Program (ISAP). The exhibit of art work will be on display April 3-28 at the Greensboro Public Library. A select show will be at Friendly Auditorium April 3-7. This section of the show will be sent to Washington Red Cross Headquarters for shipment overseas. ISAP is open to all secondary schools only.

ISAP is cosponsored by the American Junior Red Cross and the National Art Education Association. Mrs. Frances Crimm, art supervisor for Greensboro Public Schools has collected works from those secondary schools that have elected to participate. She explains that ISAP is intended to serve as a means of communication between young peoples of the world and also adults who might view the shows in other lands. Red Cross overseas uses the student art work in youth centers, childrens wards of hospitals and in chapter houses.

The remaining pieces not sent overseas will be used by the Red Cross locally in as many ways as possible in convalescent homes and in the local chapter office.
