## UNITED METHODIST CHURCHES CONFERENCE APPOINTMENTS

**LAKE JUNALUSKA** — The need for maturation of the integrated Western North Carolina United Methodist Conference is still an area of challenge, according to Bishop Earl G. Hunt Jr. of Charlotte.

The conference completed its fifth meeting recently of the group formed by the merger of the formerly all-black North Carolina-Virginia conference and the predominately white Western North Carolina conference.

Hunt told the delegates there are three other areas of challenge in addition to strengthening the integrated conference. He said there is a need to "face positively" the challenge of the

charismatic movement, a need to close the communications gap between the clergy and the laity, and to improve the quality of preaching.

The bishop, following the sermon of Dr. Thomas A. Langford, dean of the Duke University divinity school, announced the appointment of the following clergymen of the conference, including these changes from the past 12 months:

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## ST. MATTHEWS GETS NEW PASTOR, WILL PREACH SUNDAY, JUNE 25TH

At the recent session of the Western North Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, the Rev. John Jethro Patterson was appointed pastor of St. Matthews United Methodist Church at the corner of Asheboro and Florida Streets. He succeeds Joseph B. Bethea who has been pastor of St. Matthews for the past four years.

Rev. Patterson comes to St.

Matthews from a highly successful pastorate in Hickory, N. C., before that he was a pastor in High Point and a District Superintendent in the former North Carolina-Virginia Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Rev. Patterson assumes the pastorate on Wednesday, June 21 and will deliver his first sermon to the congregation on Sunday, June 25 at 11:00 A.M.

## A&T Receives 1/2 Million More To Aid Teaching

A&T State University was awarded two grants totaling \$549,000 Tuesday from the National Science Foundation for the upgrading of its science education programs.

The grants were a part of \$2.2 million awarded nationally to six predominately black colleges.

A&T received a grant of \$237,300 to be divided among the departments of biology, chemistry and physics.

Dr. Walter Sullivan, chairman of the Department of Chemistry, said the new funds will be used to employ additional faculty members so that students can be given more individual attention.

"This program will enable us to bring in some specialists for our teaching staff," said Sullivan. For its project, the Department of Biology will experiment with individualized automated learning techniques. The department will establish an audio-tutorial learning center.

Sullivan said all three departments will use some of the funds to purchase much needed scientific equipment.
