## A\&T Receives 1/2 Million More To Aid Teaching

A\&T State University was awarded two grants totaling $\$ 549,000$ Tuesday from the National Science Foundation for the upgrading of its science education programs.
The grants were a part of $\$ 2.2$ million awarded nationally to six predominately black colleges. A\&T received a grant of \$237,300 to be divided among the departments of biology, chemistry and physics.
Dr. Walter Sullivan, chairman of the Department of Chemistry, said the new funds will be used to employ additional faculty members so that students can be given more individual attention.
"This progrom will enable us to bring in some specialists for our teaching staff," said Sullivan. For its project, the Department of Biology will experiment with individualized automated learning techniques. The department will establish an audiotutorial learning center.
Sullivan said all three departments will use some of the funds to purchase much needed scientific equipment.
