On a whirl-wind tour of North Carolina's public colleges, the commission spent an hour receiving A&T Chancellor Lewis C. Dowdy's presentation asking for monies to construct a \$2.8 million Natural Science Building, a \$1.52 million Social Science Building and a \$1.5 million Art-Humanities Center.
