Interest in the program has been most gratifying and it has won a permanent place here. All employees of the yard, up to and including quartermen, a r e eligible to make suggestions and receive awards.

At this writing, consideration of the January suggestions has not been completed but during the first 11 months of operation 169 proposals have received awards ranging from \$5 in War Savings stamps to \$100 in War bonds. The total issue value of the awards is \$2,117.50 and the maturity value, \$2,825. These ideas have extended from minor suggestions for improvement of yard housekeeping to proposals regarding ship construction that have saved many thousands of dollars and numerous man-
