It had been felt that something heroic would have to be done, and Mr. Roosevelt's bold stroke electrified the people. President Roosevelt evidently has in mind a single point resolution or act of Congress designed to cope with the situation created by the drain of gold. As the House must organize before legislating, it is possible that the bank holiday will be conup ready for action, and since there delay beyond next Monday is apprehended. Presumably banks will resafeguarding the gold supply. Exports of gold must be prevented until foreign speculation quits the futile effort to throw the United States off the gold standard.

It may be wise for the Senate committee on banking to investigate this foreign speculation in American gold, for the purpose of identifying the individuals in this country who have aided foreigners in the attack upon this country's financial integoperations after the President has forbidden them, and no furter inrity.
