**Lost Confidence**

The attitude of the people has reached a point where there is little or no confidence, one man to the other. This attitude has been brought about by the inability of men to meet their honest obligations.

In days of prosperity, practically every industrious man knew how to acquire means to meet his obligations and it became a habit to make obligations to work for, and it was a pleasure to pay debts. This habit followed the average man into the present crisis and before he realized the fact, his obligations became so heavy and his earning power fell to such a degree that he could not pay on the date of promise, consequently, a loss of confidence among men developed until it became contagious and spread world wide.

Because certain men could not meet the payment of their respective obligations, others figured that the entire world was bankrupt and naturally their confidence in men of less ability was questioned.

The loss of confidence among men is the direct cause of the present banking situation. Men became afraid of the banking institutions and began drawing their money out to hoard it away, thinking it probably safer. As a result, the gold standard was lowered and the amount supposed to be in circulation was much decreased.

When we sound the present crisis of things down to a finality we will find that lack of money in circulation is one direct cause. This cause in large measure is due to the lost confidence among men for each other.

The remedy will inevitably be more money in circulation and a solid foundation of all commodities, instead of control by power interests and the fluctuation of certain markets.

People will have to begin to place confidence, not only in their neighbor, but in the leaders of the state and nation and legislate sound laws that do not react on the laboring class of men. This, of course, will not eliminate all troubles, but will be a step in the right direction to restore normal conditions.

**Meeting the Situation**

Public reaction to President Roosevelt's proclamation of a bank holiday has been admirable in its cheerfulness and co-operative spirit. Instead of arousing fears, the decisive action of the President allayed them. It had been felt that something heroic would have to be done, and Mr. Roosevelt's bold stroke electrified the people. His act was compared with that of a clear-headed surgeon who, in the midst of a panicky crowd, applies a tourniquet to a man bleeding from an artery and stops the flow of blood.

Stoppage of the flow of gold was the prime necessity. President Roosevelt's action instantly stopped this bleeding. Steps may now be taken more deliberately to mend the situation.

President Roosevelt evidently has in mind a single point resolution or act of Congress designed to cope with the situation created by the drain of gold. As the House must organize before legislating, it is possible that the bank holiday will be continued for a short time. But the proposed legislation will be drawn up ready for action, and since there is but one mind on the subject, no delay beyond next Monday is apprehended. Presumably banks will resume operations under limitations safeguarding the gold supply. Exports of gold must be prevented until foreign speculation quits the futile effort to throw the United States off the gold standard.

It may be wise for the Senate committee on banking to investigate this foreign speculation in American gold, for the purpose of identifying the individuals in this country who have aided foreigners in the attack upon this country's financial integrity after the President has forbidden them, and no further injury. The law heavily penalizes such jury from that source may be looked for.

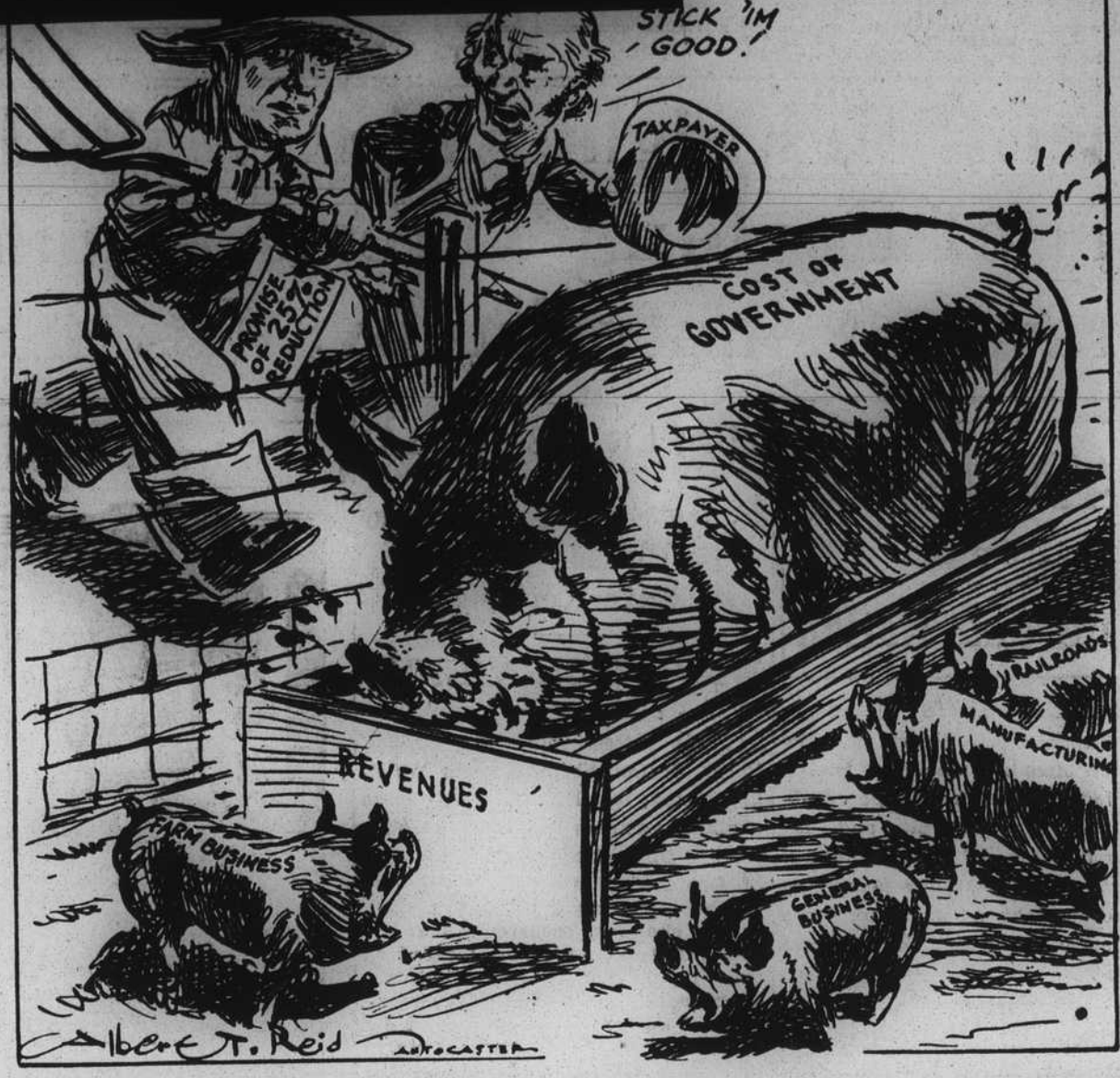
