Tar Heels May Reach 33,811 By March

North Carolina will furnish approximately 33,811 native sons for the regular enlistments of the army, navy and marine corps by the end of the year closing on March 1, the War Department revealed last week.

Basing these figures on actual enrollment and anticipated increases, army officers estimate that by March 1, North Carolina will have sent 21,696 men into the army, 9,945 into the navy and 2,170 into the marine corps during the 12-month period.

After the first of the year selective service inductions of North Carolinians is expected to be stepped up. It is estimated that the average induction will reach 3000 a month between January and April. The present national goal of 800,000 is due to be attained by July 1, after which the corps areas will start planning replacements for men who will complete the year's training.

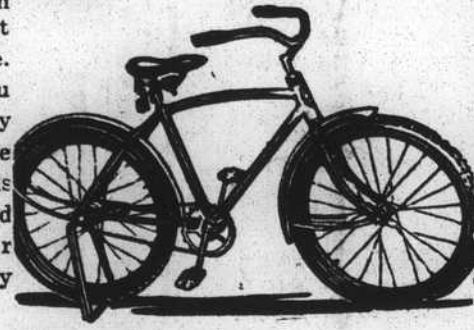
