The Doctrine Of Election

Most of the difficulties and objections to this doctrine grow out of inferences from it, and not an understanding of it. The following ten statements give a brief summary of the doctrine, God's purpose of salvation.

1. God takes the initiative in salvation.
2. All efficiency in salvation is from God.
3. What God does in saving He purposed eternally to do.
4. Salvation is a matter of grace on God's part.
5. God's purpose includes the use of means in saving men.
6. God's purpose is not to save men apart from faith and holiness, but to produce holiness through faith.
7. God's purpose to save the elect does not mean that God desires or causes the ruin of the non-elect. They are lost because of their own perversity.
8. God's purpose includes all the good a man will do. It includes service as well as salvation.
9. Hence God's purpose is the ground of assurance in undertaking what we believe He wants us to do.
10. God does not purpose to save any man as an isolated individual, but in his social and historical environment.

How important, often, is the pain of guilt, as a stimulant to amendment and reformation.—John Foster.
