Legal Notice

FISHING

In accordance with authority vested in the North Carolina Board of Conservation and Development by Chapter Thirty-five, Public Laws of 1935, the said Board in regular session on July 21-23, 1941, at Morehead City, North Carolina, adopted the following regulations:

It shall be unlawful to fish in or take fish from Little River in Alleghany County from Whitehead Mill to the Virginia Line until the opening of the regular fishing season in 1943.

It shall be unlawful to fish in or take fish from any stream in Alleghany County except New River each year until the opening of the regular trout season.
