\$42,000,000 Deal Is Recorded Here

A deal involving \$42,000,000, one of the largest ever filed in North Carolina, was recorded Monday with Register of Deeds W. E. Ormond. It was a state mortgage and deed of trust from the Carolina Power and Light Company to the Irvina Trust Co. and F. C. Herbert, trustee. Part of the property involved in the deal is located in Wayne County. The papers were filed as a part of a refinancing program by the company.
