APPORTIONMENT OF \$250,000 AP-PROPRIATED BY THE GEN-ERAL ASSEMBLY.

BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Fund Was Appropriated by the General Assembly of 1913 to Ald in Carrying Out Full Six Months' Term as Provided by Legislature.

Apportionment of the \$250,000 appropriation by the general assembly of 1913 for the schools of the state was made a few days ago at a meet-ing of the state board of education held in the office of Governor Craig. This fund was created out of the state treasury for the purpose of enabling the schools of the state to fill out the

required six months school term.

The new law provides for the setting aside of five cents on every hun dred dollars worth of property in the state, that is taxed, and this will be apportioned to the various counties later in the year. The total school fund will then, it is expected, exceed

The description given in this circular will be limited to the name and quantity of product, price and the grower's name, address and shipping No matter whatever of a gen eral advertising or "boosting" nature can be inserted, nor can publication be given of any special breeds or va ricties of plants or animals.

7. Any products which are not on hand but which will be produced within the present season may be included. The period within which such products will be ready for shipment should be indicated under the head of shipping date.

8. The quantity of a product may be expressed in bushels, barrels, pounds, crates or car loads.

9. All prices shall be listed at the pound, subject to change of market conditions. The local market prices requested in the last column are de sired solely for the information of this office as to what market conditions are, and will not be published or given out in any form. Only the price which the farmer asks will be

10. In addition to the above we shall appreciate any further informa-tion of market conditions which you may think of value.




