FARM LOAN BANK

On Saturday afternoon, Sept. 30, about twenty of the progressive farmers surrounding Kings Mountain completed an organization which is destined to be a great asset for the farmers of this section—namely a farm loan association. The name of this association will be, "The Kings Mountain National Farm Loan Bank," and will have jurisdiction over the territory surrounding Kings Mountain.

On Saturday, Sept. 16th, the farmers organized this bank by electing the directors, namely, J. J. Logan and L. A. Kiser, secretary and treasurer. On Saturday, Sept. 30th, the association was completed by electing M. L. Ware, R. L. Lewis and O. A. Rhea loan committee and J. R. Davis, attorney. The members also adopted the articles of the association and subscribed for stock. Already applications for loans exceed \$20,000, the requirement for charter.

The association is now ready for receiving other applications for loans. If there are any other farmers living in the territory over which this bank will have jurisdiction desiring a long term loan at a low rate of interest they may put in their application with the secretary-treasurer, L. A. Kiser, and just as soon as the District Land bank is located application will be made for a charter and loans will be made.

The above organization is the pioneer movement for this section and one that will be worth a great deal to the farmers. It will enable him to borrow money on long terms at a low rate of interest so that he can pay off his mortgages and improve his farms. J. R. D.

DEATHS

Mr. R. L. McAllister, formerly of Kings Mountain but for the past five years of Richmond, Va., died at Youngstown, Ohio, where he was building color organs, on Tuesday night, October 2nd, of organic heart trouble. The remains were brought to Kings Mountain Sunday morning and laid to rest in Mountain Rest cemetery beside his first wife at two o'clock. The funeral was conducted by the pastor, Rev. E. C. Cole, in the Methodist church of which the deceased was a member. Mr. Cole was assisted in the funeral by Rev. Chas. K. Bell.

Mr. McAllister was 79 years of age. Was twice married, first to Mrs. Katherine McAllister of Kings Mountain and to his union was born three children who survive. This wife died in December 1878. He was later married to Mrs. Laura Baker of Baldwin, Ga., who survives. He leaves also four brothers, J. E. of Gastonia, G. W. of Lincolnton, T. J. of Lancaster, S. C., and A. A. of Barnwell, S. C.

Attesting his friendship and popularity in this community was the hundreds of people attending the funeral and burying and the floral offerings placed upon the grave.

Among those attending the funeral from out of town were the four brothers named above, the widow and the three children, Mr. Baker of Baldwin, Ga., father of the widow, Mr. Herman Baker and Mrs. Wolfe of Athens, Ga., brother and aunt of the widow, Mr. and Mrs. T. R. Stewart of Bailey, N. C., Mrs. Stewart being the mother of the deceased first wife. There were several other of the deceased relatives present as well as quite a number of out of town friends of the family.

Mr. W. A. Styers, formerly of Kings Mountain but lately of Gastonia, died at his home in Gastonia September 27, after a long illness with pellagra. He was 47 years old and a member of Loray Baptist church. The remains were taken to Elizabetheth church in this county for burial, his pastor, Rev. Mr. Abernethy, conducting the funeral. Deceased leaves a widow and six children and one step child, M. M. Goins of Hopewell, Va., and the following half brothers and sisters, W. F. Styers, Tom Styers, Mrs. Bad Oates of Kings Mountain, Mrs. Rob Hord of Gaffney and Mrs. Charlie Hord of Gastonia.

Mr. Kerr Black, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Black of Elbethel section, suffered an accident on Monday afternoon which resulted in his death in about an hour. He was working with a dredging force in Anderson county, S. C. At this writing we have not the particulars of the affair. The body was brought here for interment Wednesday.

Just as we are about to lock our forms we learn that Mrs. S. B. Rhea of Danville, Va., died Tuesday morning. The remains were brought here and buried at Elbethel yesterday. Mrs. Rhea was the daughter of the late A. B. Ware of Elbethel section and a sister to Messrs. M. L. and W. E. Ware.

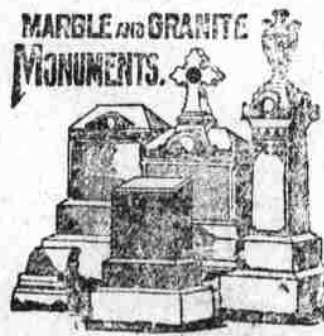
