

Kings Mountain went over the top and well into no man's land at a big Liberty Loan rally held in the school auditorium here Thursday night. After addresses by J. P. Mull and C. R. Hoey subscriptions were taken amounting to \$32,350 which was \$15,350 above the allotment for the town of \$37,000.
