The quota for Kings Mountain as fixed by the Fifth Federal Reserve District is \$70,950 and is divided between the two banks as follows: First National Bank \$38,200; Peoples Loan & Trust Co \$32,750. A delegation composed of W. A. Mauney, Elmer Herndon and Wiley H. McGinnis went to Shelby Saturday to confer with the county organization with reference to apportioning the county's quota among the several communities and it was decided that Kings Mountain's part should be \$86,800. But the report from the Federal Reserve committee came along Tuesday and upset this by fixing our quota at \$70,950.

Application has been made for a charter for the A. H. Cornwell Co. which has been organized for the purpose of manufacturing automobile parts, doing general repair work and sewerage work. A. H. Cornwell, machinist at the Dilling mill will take charge May first and will be manager of the company. C. B. Falls and others are stock holders. The company will be incorporated with a paid-in capital of \$5,000 with privilege of increasing to \$50,000. The company will open shop on Cherokee avenue in the place vacated by J. J. Allied. Mr. John Jones has returned to Kings Mountain and is doing sewerage work and will work for this new company.

MRS. DOVER DEAD

Mrs. Asa Dover died Saturday night at the home of Mr. W. L. LeRicheux at the age of 69 years. The body was taken to Elbethel Sunday afternoon and laid to rest. Rev. E. L. Kirk conducted the funeral. She was a member of Elbethel Methodist church. She and her husband had made their home with Mr. and Mrs. LeRicheux for the past several years. Her husband and the following children survive: Mrs. W. L. LeRicheux, Mrs. B. F. Lindsay of Kings Mountain; Mrs. Adam Hord, of Gastonia; Charlie and Robert Dover of Shelby; Lee and Lawson Dover of Waco, and M. J. Dover who has just returned from France.

WHISKEY STILL TAKEN

Officers Rhodes, Falls and Charley Stewart went a hunting Sunday morning and found a big blockade in operation just beyond the monument. For a rarity the operators were found too, four of them. Bob Sheppard was captured and the other three escaped. The still was located in South Carolina and Sheppard was taken to York where his father went \$300 bond and he was released.

Officers Rhodes and Falls with revenue officers Bob Rhyne and Charley Stewart captured another big blockade still near the monument. They found 1200 gallons of beer and a sack of sugar but no man.

Officers Rhodes, Falls and Bob Rhyne made another raid Saturday in the mountains and found a big outfit minus the still. South Carolina officers had preceded them to the spot an hour before and got 10 gallons of whiskey.



FARMERS DECIDE TO ORGANIZE GIN WITH \$7,500 CAPITAL STOCK

Henkel McGinnis has bought Henry's interest in the grocery department. The new firm will be known as McGinnis & Long composed of Henkel McGinnis and Robert Long. As soon as practical Mr. McGinnis will close out the groceries and a stock of furniture, stoves and ranges will be added to the tin business and Mr. McGinnis and Mr. Long will be equal partners all the way around. Mr. Groves is moving his electric shoe shop to another building. Mr. Henry McGinnis has not announced his intentions. Mr. Robert Long is said to be an expert tinner and he will be in charge of that department. The change of business does not affect the ownership of the building which he longs to McGinnis Brothers.

MRS. MAUNEY'S FATHER DIED SUNDAY

Mrs. R. L. Mauney will have the sympathy of her many friends in the death of her father, Prof. W. D. Redfern, who died at his home in Ansonville Sunday morning at the age of 82 years. He had been sick for a long time and Mrs. Mauney had spent quite a good deal of her time of late at his bedside. She and Mr. Mauney and children were there when the end came and remained for the funeral.

Deceased was a native of Anson county and served the county for many years as superintendent of public instruction. He served throughout the civil war as a member of Company A, 23d North Carolina regiment. He was married to Miss Wainfred S. Watkins, December 11, 1859.

He was a prominent member of the Ansonville Methodist church.

He leaves his wife, three children, C. W. Redfern, of Ansonville; Mrs. J. A. Baldwin, of Charlotte, and Mrs. R. L. Mauney, of Kings Mountain; several grandchildren and a host of friends to mourn his loss.

The funeral was conducted from the late residence Monday afternoon and interment made in Ansonville cemetery.

Mr. Jim Pryor and Miss Mary Lee Ward, both of Kings Mountain, were united in matrimony at the home of Rev. M. C. Connor last Saturday night at ten o'clock. Rev. E. L. Henderson of Central, S. C., who is conducting revival services at the Wesleyan church, officiated at the wedding.

The farmers are to meet again Saturday afternoon to organize the co operative cotton ginnery. It is especially requested that every person who has subscribed to this stock be present to vote in the election of officers and directors. The canvassing committee reported at the meeting last Saturday the results of their efforts which brought up the total number of subscribers to 45. But most of those reporting had several prospects in view which they believed they could induce to sign up during the week. On motion it was decided to organize and incorporate when 75 men had signed up making a capital of \$7,500. This goal it is expected will be reached by time for the meeting Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock. The present idea is to incorporate with a paid-in capital of \$7,500 with privilege of increasing to probably \$25,000 or what ever amount is decided upon. Members of the committee explained that they had been so busy during the week that they had not been able to see near all the people who would likely be interested in the proposition and it was thought to be a comparatively easy matter to sell the remainder of the stock this week.
