Government To Register Babies

Raleigh, Jan. 21 .- "Register Your Baby.

This admonition is the slogan of a campaign Uncle Sam will conduct in every county in North Carolina during the next few weeks, going into every city, town, village, com . munity and the ruralside in an ef. fort to get a complete record , of every baby born in the State during the past 12 months.

State laws require that every do: tor or midwife who attenls a mother at a birth make a report of such birth and this is usually done. On occasions, however, midwives, par ticularly, and doctors occasionally, fail to make the proper report, with the result that there is no permanent record of the birth, and birth certificate is later available. And many times, during the life of the average man, it becomes, in. portant, even vital to establish his age.

The Federal Government is at. tempting to complete the records of births of babies throughout United States and is calling upon all parents in North Carolina now to aid in this compilation. The cam paign is being conducted by United States Bureau of the ' Census, through the North Carolina State Board of Health and with the aid of the North Carolina Emerg ency Relieg Administration.

Early in February the Bureau of Census, with the aid of the Postoffice Department, will distribute to every family in the State a " card on which a few simple facts are to be filled in, and the card dropped in a mail box, without postage The principal effort is to ret all parents to whom babies have been born with in the past year to fill in these cards and mail them. This act makes sure that the child .re... ported is then propertly recorded and a certificate of birth will easy to secure. A complete response to the call is sought.
