TIMELY FARM QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q.-What is the value of the range shelter in poultry production?

A .- The range shelter is a recent addition to the development of practical poultry production and, as the name implies, supplies shelter for the birds during the developing age. The greatest value of the shelter is cheapness of construction. Due to the way it is built it can be readily moved from range to range thus re ducing the hazard of soil infection. plans for building these shelters may be secured by writing the Poultry Department at State College,

Q .- How often should cream be

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






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
