Overcrowding the laying birds in fall and winter robs them of their vitality and makes them susceptible

Roy S. Dearstyne, head of the State College poultry recommends that the birds be given adequate housing facilities, There was plenty of ice Monday the circus profession. Hence, the plenty of ventilation, but no drafts. The colds and roup from which flocks suffer during the fall months may be traced to inadequate venti-

lation, he said. As cold weather approaches, continued, it is advisable to check the birds again for parasites, both internal and external. Infected birds should be treated at once.

Birds to be used for breeding pur poses should be blood tested pullorum disease. When requested, the State Department of Agriculture will send an expert to make these
